Why a community forum?

Every five years, Evoenergy must submit a regulatory proposal to the Australian Energy Regulator.

- Your feedback will help shape Evoenergy's next proposal for its gas network.
- Evoenergy wants feedback from consumers to enable them to make informed decisions and better understand the values and long-term interests of its customers to develop this proposal.







Evoenergy's networks




Our gas network represents:

- ~ 3% of total volume of gas distributed to consumers across National Energy Market
- ~ 4% of total gas customers in the National Energy Market

Our gas network

Evoenergy in the gas supply chain



Contribution to gas bill



Evoenergy is a monopoly provider of gas services and is subject to a range of Territory, State and Commonwealth regulation



Safety and reliability of gas services



Ban on new gas connections



Prices, services and revenue



Security of Critical Infrastructure (SOCI)



Workplace safety

- Gas and electricity network businesses are 'natural monopolies' we do not operate in a competitive market
- To ensure the interests of consumers are protected, the maximum revenue we can earn is regulated by the Australian Energy Regulator
- Every five years we submit a plan to the Australian Energy Regulator for review to determine the amount of revenue we can earn from our customers
- The regulatory framework is set out in the National Gas Rules and National Electricity Rules and requires Evoenergy to submit proposals to the Australian Energy Regulator for assessment
- The main role of economic regulation is to set efficient prices for customers using the gas and electricity networks, while balancing customer outcomes in terms of quality, safety, reliability, security and achieving emissions reductions policies — National Gas
 Objective & National Electricity Objectives

Evoenergy's five-year investment plan

We need to ensure we have the right level of funding so that we can serve the long-term interests of our consumers by:



Continuing to provide a safe and reliable gas supply at acceptable service levels



Continuing to meet our regulatory obligations



Providing an adequate return to shareholders for investment in gas network



Responding to the ACT Government's electrification pathway (phase out of fossil fuel gas)

Doing all this as efficiently as possible



How Evoenergy's revenue is recovered from customers



based on efficient costs to be recovered during GN26



Gas demand

based on forecast or actual gas demand over the next 5 years



Network tariffs

set across different charges to recover allowed revenue

~\$320 million over five years

~154,000 customers
business and household
~7,691.8 TJ per annum

Average ACT gas bill ~\$1,875 per annum 4-person household



ACT Government's plan to phase out fossil fuel gas







The ACT Government is supporting the consumer led transition through various incentives. This stage includes a phase-in of a ban on new gas connections from December 2023.

Stage 2 2030 – 2035: Accelerating the transition

The ACT Government continues to encourage behavioural change and provide information to assist the community, as well as introducing additional measures to accelerate the transition. This stage could include implementation of regulatory measures.



Stage 3 2035 – 2040: Electric Canberra delivering for households

The ACT Government expects a focus on the phased decommissioning of the gas network.

Household gas appliances are getting older and they are being replaced with electric appliances






Demand for Evoenergy's gas services is falling

Demand for our gas services is falling



- 1. Get the ACT ready for our electric future

- 3. Prioritise a fair and equitable transition to net zero
- Educate our community and industry to prioritise and take action to manage a sustainable and responsible transition
- 5. Provide policy certainty so industry and community investments are made in the right areas at the right time
- 6. Develop policy which contributes to building a strong and stable energy system powered by renewables
- Capitalise on the significant reputation and economic benefits for the ACT as a world leader in the transition
- 8. Establish the conditions for a transition by supporting the development of a net zero emissions ecosystem.
